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“COURT FOR DIVORCE AND MATRIMONIAL CAUSES, Nov. 24.
(Before the JUDGE-ORDINARY.)

WOOLGER V. WOOLGER

This was a wife's petition for judicial separation on the ground of adultery. The respondent pleaded a denial of the charge and condonation.

Dr. Tristram appeared for the petitioner, and Dr. Spinks for the respondent.

The marriage was as long ago as January, 1824, and the parties lived together happily until 1857 and had six children. The husband kept a coffeeshop near Bryanston-square. In June, 1857, he left his house and went to live with a woman named Simmons. He afterwards wrote to ask his wife to forgive him, and she consented to receive him again if he would break off his connexion with Simmons. He accordingly returned to cohabitation, but in the middle of 1858 he again left his home, and has since lived with Simmons as her husband at Kingston. Judicial separation decreed.”
