“THE POLICE COURTS.

IMPUDENT THEFTS.

At Westminster, HENRY SAUNDERS, calling himself a pork butcher from Nunhead, was finally examined on charges of robbery at Messrs. Gorrings, drapers, of Buckingham Palace-road, and also at an establishment in Piccadilly. On the afternoon of the 3rd inst. Mr. Samuel Woolger, one of the directors of Gorrings saw the prisoner leaving a private room with an overcoat and umbrella which belonged to him (Mr. Woolger). A fortnight previously the witness had been robbed in a similar manner, and pawntickets relating to this theft and also to one from a draper's shop in Piccadilly were found on the prisoner. Mr. Sheil sentenced him on the different charges to 12 months' hard labour. “
